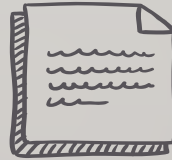
CENSUS 2020 TIMELINE

CENSUS 2020 PROCESS

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

 **95%** of households will receive their census invitation in the mail.



 **Almost 5%** of households will receive their census invitation when a census taker drops it off.

 **Less than 1%** of households will be counted in person by a census taker, instead of being invited to

WHAT WE WILL SEND IN THE MAIL

On or between	You'll receive:
March 12–20	An invitation to respond online to the 2020 Census. (Some households will also receive paper questionnaires.)
March 16–24	A reminder letter.
	If you haven't responded yet:
March 26–April 3	A reminder postcard.
April 8–16	A reminder letter and paper questionnaire.
April 20–27	A final reminder postcard before we follow up in person.

- ◆ Hispanic Origin
- ◆ Relationship (including same/opposite sex)
- ◆ Tenure (owner/renter)

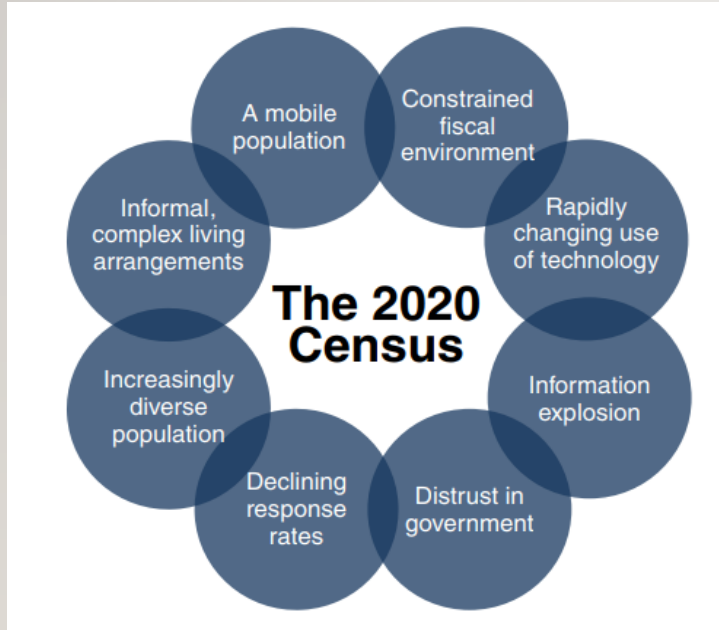

CENSUS-RELATED RISKS

◆ Undercount

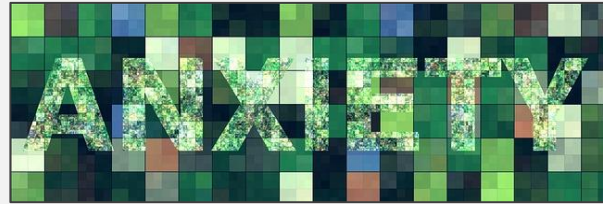
- young children
- people of color
- low-income households
- foreign-born residents
- rural residents

◆ Incomplete/incorrect information

◆ Scams and fraud

REASONS FOR UNDERCOUNT

- ◆ Home address not included in Census roster
- ◆ Complex household relationships
- ◆ Mistrust of government / privacy fears
- ◆ Language issues

SOURCES OF SUSPICION AND FEAR

◆ The process:

- Who is sending this letter/postcard to me?
- Who is calling me?
- Who is coming to my home?

◆ The outcomes:

- What will happen to my information?
- What will happen to me?
- What will happen to my family?

REASONS FOR “CONCEALMENT”

Census Bureau researchers have identified five reasons that people conceal additional people who are living in the household (and thus undercount a house):

- Fear of losing government assistance
- Housing issues
- Don't want to expose poverty
- Anxiety about law enforcement or criminal justice system
- Immigration status

WHAT TO DO: PROVIDE GUIDANCE

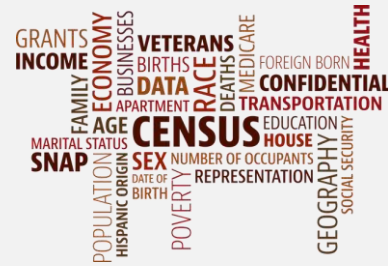
- ◆ The real Census letter/postcard will come from Jeffersonville, IN, and will be addressed to “resident.”
- ◆ To find out if a survey is really from the Census Bureau, you can call your regional office and ask, “Am I in a survey?”
- ◆ To find out if a caller or visitor is really from the Census Bureau, you can call the national processing center at 1-800-523-2305. Also, ask to see the person’s U.S. Census badge.

WAYS TO FOLLOW UP

- ◆ **Report fraud:** <https://www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov/>
- ◆ Forward potentially bogus emails and website URLs to the Census Bureau at ois.fraud.reporting@census.gov
- ◆ Use Census Bureau materials

THINGS A REAL CENSUS EMPLOYEE WILL NEVER DO

- ◆ Refuse to let you read her/his U.S. Census badge
- ◆ Tell you that you must pay a fee or wire money
- ◆ Ask for your full Social Security number, bank account number, or credit/debit card number
- ◆ Threaten you
- ◆ Make you hurry to answer



THINK ABOUT YOUR SITUATION

- ◆ Reasons your program participants might have for not participating in the Census
- ◆ Census-related problems that your program participants might have or encounter
- ◆ Ways to address those issues and encourage participation
- ◆ Ways to address those problems before or after they arise

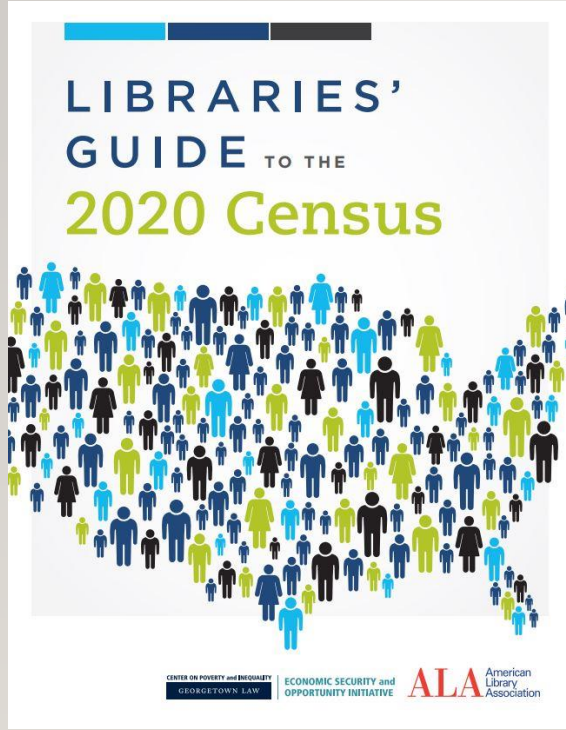

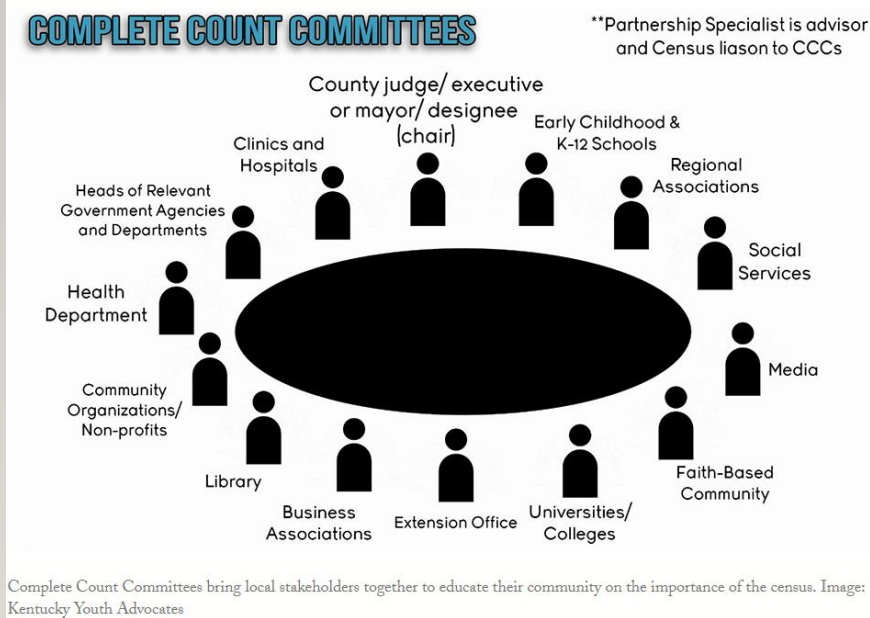

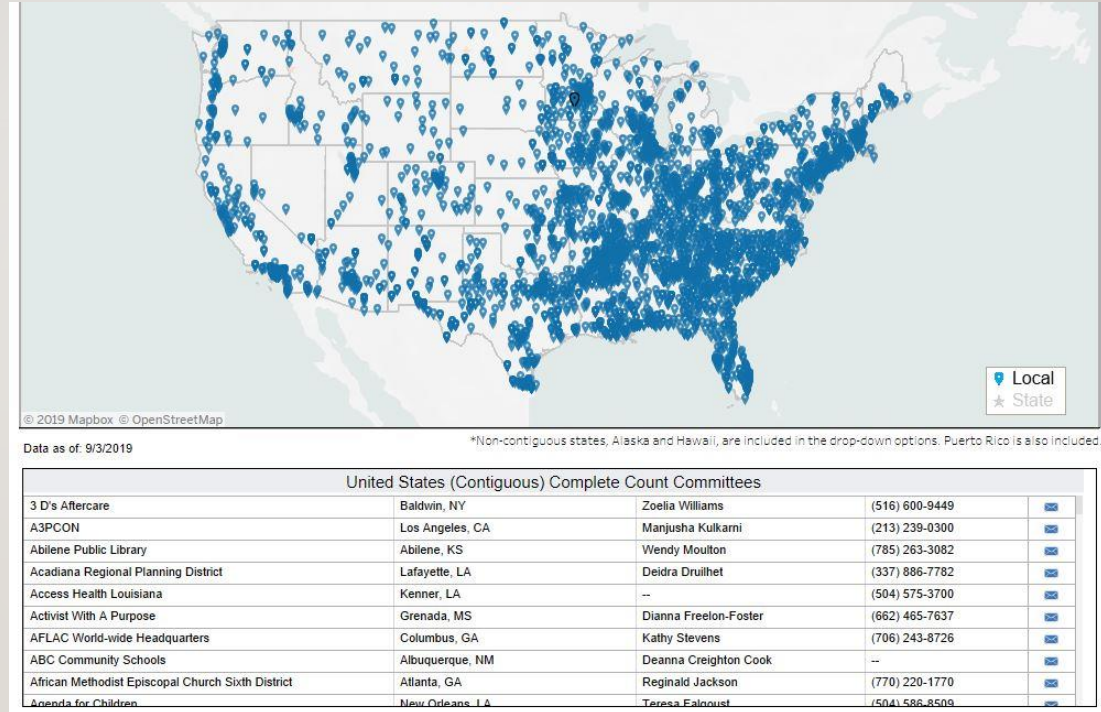

LEARN THE CENSUS BASICS

The 2020 Census and Confidentiality


Your responses to the 2020 Census are safe, secure, and protected by Federal law. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics—they cannot be used against you in any way. By law, all responses to U.S. Census Bureau household and business surveys are kept completely confidential.

Respond to the 2020 Census to shape the future.

Responding to the census helps communities get the funding they need and helps businesses make data-driven decisions that grow the economy. Census data impacts our daily lives, informing important decisions about funding for roads and infrastructure in your community, including health care, senior centers, jobs, political representation, roads, schools, and business. More than \$675 billion in federal funding flows back to states and local communities each year.

The law is clear—no personal information can be shared.

Under Title 13 of the U.S. Code, the Census Bureau cannot release any information collected for census statistics, even if it is shared with other federal agencies.



The 2020 Census at a Glance

Counting everyone once, only once, and in the right place.

The U.S. Census Bureau is the federal government's largest statistical agency. We are dedicated to providing current facts and figures about America's people, places, and economy. Federal law protects the confidentiality of all individual responses the Census Bureau collects.

The U.S. Constitution requires that each decade we take a count—a census—of America's population.

CENSUS 101: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The 2020 Census is closer than you think! Here's a quick refresher of what it is and why it's essential that everyone is counted.


Everyone counts.

The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once, and in the right place.




It's about fair representation.

Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives.

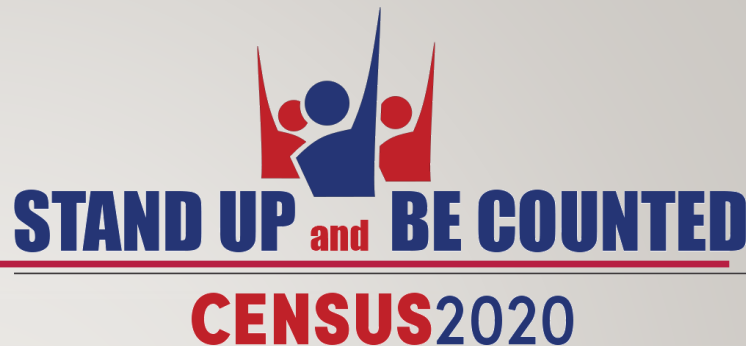

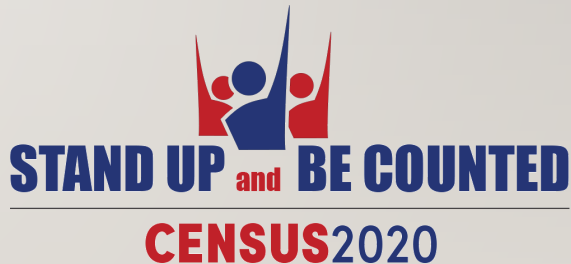

2020 CENSUS JOB APPLICANT REQUIREMENTS

- ✓ At least 18 years old
- ✓ Valid Social Security Number
- ✓ U.S. citizen
- ✓ Valid email address
- ✓ Pass criminal background check
- ✓ Able to work flexible hours

- ✓ Complete application
- ✓ Commit to completing the training (in English or Spanish)

For most jobs:

- ✓ Valid driver's license and a vehicle
- ✓ Access to a computer with internet access
